After our visit to Tallulah Falls, Georgia, we continued north toward Asheville, North Carolina.














It was nice to see spring green leaves and buds throughout the town and along the roads.


But we had another North Carolina destination up the road.



We were heading for Mount Airy.





And so, a couple of decades ago, when businesses started closing down in town, some smart folks decided to capitalize on the connection and built the Andy Griffith Museum.
